WELCOME TO CHRIST CHURCH

You are very welcome at Christ Church. Anglicans believe that one of the most important things we do as Christians is gather together for worship. Our main opportunity to do so is the Sunday morning worship service.

There will be a friendly greeter who will provide you with a bulletin that details our announcements. Please always feel free to approach these greeters (often referred to as a Sides Person) should you have any questions. They are more than happy to direct you to the right person or pass your query along.

THE COMMUNION

All baptized persons are welcome to receive Holy Communion.

Those not receiving Communion may wish to receive a Blessing. Please cross your hands over your chest to indicate this to the Priest.

Communicants who do not wish to drink from the chalice, should not dip the bread into the cup. Instead, after eating the bread, cross your hands over your chest as the chalice bearer passes by, or make a sign of reverence by gently touching the base of the cup when it is presented to you.

Those drinking from the chalice are asked to assist the chalice bearer by lightly grasping it at the base and guiding it to your lips.

Our nursery located on the main floor at the end of the hallway on the left. If you are unfamiliar with its location, please simply ask one of our Sides Persons (ushers) to point the way. Please also know that the bathroom located nearby the nursery is equipped with a changing station.



Canada's Hundred Days and the Armistice 100th Anniversary of Armistice - 1918-2018



On August 8, 1918, Allied forces on the Western Front launched a major offensive against the German lines near the town of Amiens, France.

The Battle of Amiens marked the beginning of Canada's Hundred Days and the last three months of the First World War. During this period a series of impressive Canadian Corps victories on the Western Front solidified their reputation as elite shock troops.

Following the success of the Canadian Corps and their Allies in the Battle of Amiens, the Canadians were moved north back to Arras. Having little rest, they continued to pressure the German forces, breaking the Drocourt-Quéant Line on September 2, breaching the Hindenburg Line with the capture of Bourlon Wood on September 27, and then pressing on through Cambrai, Mount Houy, Valenciennes and into Mons, Belgium in October and early November 1918.

During the last three months of the First World War, the Canadian Corps advanced roughly 130 kilometres and took some 32,000 German prisoners and captured almost 3,800 enemy artillery pieces, machine guns and mortars. By the conclusion of Canada's Hundred Days, 30 Canadians and Newfoundlanders had earned the Victoria Cross, the highest decoration for valour they could receive.

Canada's Hundred Days culminated with the end of the First World War and the signing of the Armistice on November 11, 1918.

In 2018, the Government of Canada will mark the 65th anniversary of the Korean War Armistice, the 10th anniversary of National Peacekeepers' Day and the 100th anniversary of Canada's Hundred Days and the Armistice—milestones on the road to peace and freedom we continue to walk today.

Among the wheat fields of the olden years.

Before our eyes a boundless wall of red
Shot through by sudden streaks of jagged pain!
Then a slow-gathering darkness overhead
And rest came on us like a quiet rain.

Not we the conquered! Not to us the shame,
Who hold our earthen ramparts, nor shall cease
To hold them ever; victors we, who came
In that fierce moment to our honoured peace.

In Flanders Fields and Other Poems of the First World War

JOHN MCCRAE (1872-1918) was born in Guelph, Ontario. He studied medicine at the University of Toronto, finishing at the top of his class. In 1899, he was awarded a fellowship in pathology at McGill University, but delayed further study to serve in the Boer War. A lieutenant-colonel, he served the greater part of the First World War as a surgeon at the front and at a hospital in Boulogne, where he died of pneumonia complicated by meningitis. His only collection of verse, *In Flanders Field and Other Poems*, was published a year after his death.
