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Rector's Message

By now you most likely have heard that I have been nominated in an episcopal election in the Diocese of Algoma (October 13th and 14th in Sault Ste. Marie). I proceed to this election with the full support and consent of each member of my family. I am grateful to God for my wife Kim and our sons Spencer and Avery who are ready to relocate to the Sault if so called.

Algoma was the first Diocese in which I served. It was in Algoma where I became an active lay person, first as an underground miner and later as Police Officer. It was in Algoma the church discerned a call to the Priesthood for me. It was with Algoma I went through the enquiry, postulant, seminarian and ordained stages of formation and it was at the Cathedral in the Sault where I served my assistant curacy.

It seems fitting that this diocese will also discern a possible call to Episcopal ministry. As with all processes of discernment, "yes" or "no" is the right answer according to our Lord's will. It is clear that God did not call me to be a Bishop in the Diocese of Toronto. It may also be clear that he does not want me to be a Bishop at all. But, it is also possible that he may intend me to be the Bishop of Algoma. Please pray for me, the other candidates and the members of Synod that God's will be done in this election.

Where is God calling me to serve? We will all know on October 13th. One thing is for sure, I can't think of a finer parish than Christ Church, Brampton. As I look to the future of Christ Church, I am filled with confidence and hope. We are on the cusp of newer, brighter days, welcoming new parishioners and new staff.

Welcome to the Rev. Jeff Nowers, our new Assistant Curate, and Elias Hanna, our new Youth Ministry Director. We will be blessed by their ministry and we pray that we will be a blessing to them through prayer, participation and commitment. If you haven't already done so, please take the time to introduce yourself.

Warm, Friendly, Caring...

Christ Church Anglican is a warm and caring community that has been serving God in Brampton since its inception in 1851. We are fully wheelchair accessible with special parking at the north side of the building and a ramp at the west door on Elizabeth Street. There is an elevator that provides access to the lower church hall. Accessible bathrooms are located on both floors. Ample free street parking is available nearby.



Sunday Services include a Said Eucharist at 7:45 am, a Contemporary Eucharist at 9:00 am, and a Choral Eucharist at 10:45 am. Sunday school classes are available for children from aged 3 to grade 6 at the 9:00 am and 10:45 am services, which also includes a staffed nursery room. We have occasional events for youth and a twice a month program for grades 6 and up.

Baptisms are celebrated at specific dates throughout the year. The church provides preparation for sponsors, godparents, and older candidates. Those interested in the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation or Marriage are welcome to contact the clergy.

Christ Church is active in community outreach, supporting the Knights' Table, Salvation Army's Family Life Centre, Regeneration, Ste. Louise, Our Place Peel and more. We also participate in Caring and Sharing at Christmas.

We have committed lay participation in all aspects of worship, and we have a number of active fellowship groups within the parish.

We hope you are interested by what you read within these pages, decide to learn more about us, and become more involved yourself, with our active and friendly parish community.

Why not reach out to such folks in your circle and ask them to come to church with you this fall?

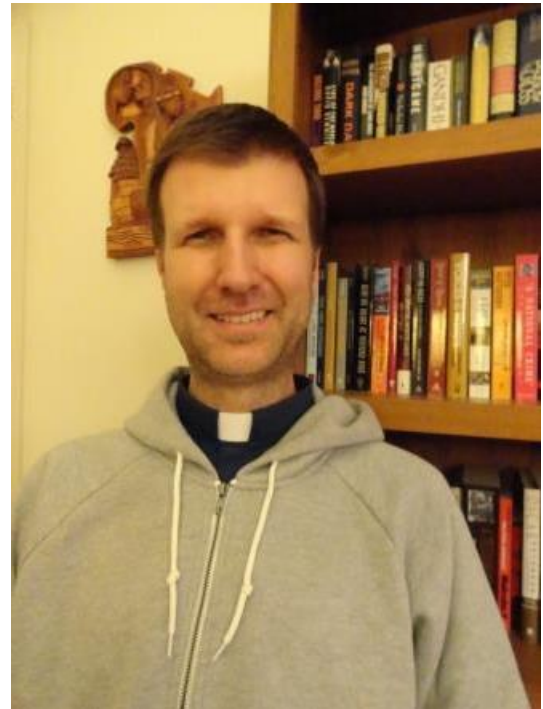
We have so much for which to be thankful! Although we may not know the future, we know who holds the future.

Curate's Corner

Hello, Christ Church! I'm your new Assistant Curate, and I'm thrilled to be joining you. Thank you for welcoming me so warmly. An Assistant Curate is a newly ordained person who is undertaking a kind of apprenticeship to gain experience in the work of a priest. I was ordained a Deacon at St. James Cathedral on May 1, 2016, and I hope to be ordained a priest, at Christ Church, sometime next spring.

I was born in Winnipeg and lived as a youngster in Vancouver, but I grew up in Toronto. After I graduated high school many moons ago, I thought I'd have a career in urban planning because I was interested in neighbourhood organizing and community renewal. But then I became fascinated with theology, even though I didn't have much of a commitment to the church at the time. My goals began to shift. I set my sights on becoming a theology Professor. However, the more I studied theology, the more I was drawn to the Anglican Church and its liturgy. I became an Anglican, was eventually confirmed by Archbishop Colin Johnson, and now here I am as a transitional Deacon. My Anglican formation has been mostly within the "Anglo-Catholic" tradition, and I'm very interested in Franciscan spirituality.



People often ask me where I went to seminary, Wycliffe or Trinity? Neither. Many years ago some unique circumstances led me to McMaster University, and I spent five years there, first in the Divinity College and then on the other side of the campus doing postgraduate studies in religion. Recently I've been based downtown at the University of Toronto, writing a Ph.D. dissertation (it's actually a big book) about the philosopher Hegel and his influence on Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a theologian who was executed by the Nazis for his role in a plot to assassinate Hitler. I took this past summer to spend a lot of time writing. It's not quite finished, but there's light at the end of the tunnel. Stay tuned!

Over the years I've held many different kinds of jobs. I've taught theology courses at Trinity College, served on the pastoral staff of St. James Cathedral, and worked as an administrator for a Mennonite research and teaching centre. I've also loaded flatbed trucks in a steel factory, assessed internal retail theft as a licensed private investigator, delivered daily mail and parcels on campus, and supervised the use of trades equipment and tools. I enjoy cycling, playing table tennis, and shooting free throws (I was born with a basketball in my hands). Another thing you should know is that I'm a huge music history buff. I like to read about jazz while I listen to it, and I've also got an extensive collection of classic soul and funk!

I'm married to Alison Hari-Singh, and she works at St. James Cathedral with young adults. Every now and then she'll be able to join me at Christ Church. In the meantime, I look forward to getting to know all of you and journeying with you. Christ Church has a bright future, and I'm blessed to be a part of it.

People Profile

Featuring short information spotlights on people at Christ Church to help us get to know each other better. This profile was done as a Q&A between Ron and Elizabeth in honour of his coming first anniversary at Christ Church

Ron Greidanus

What started your career in music?

According to my mother, before I could speak, I would dance in my playpen any time music came on the radio. Following her observation in my rhythmic prowess, it was clear at a fairly early age that I should be enrolled in music lessons. Before taking formal lessons at the age of 11, I was the only boy in an all girls' choir for 4 years, which was unheard of in a Dutch farming community. Once enrolled as a piano student with local piano teacher, I then proceeded to go through 9 grades in 4 years, having self-learnt Tchaikovsky's First Piano Concerto at 16.

What led to your interest in church music?

Before my first position as a church organist at the age of 14, at Middleton's Anglican church, my Christian upbringing was nurtured in the Christian Reformed Church, rooted in deep Calvinist theology. On my exit from the CRC I have played in a number of Anglican churches across Europe and North America.

What attracts you about the Anglican musical tradition?

It was an easy transition for me musically to enter the world of the Anglican Church. The traditional services contain so much possibility through the use of psalms, canticles, plainsong and anthems. Even though I loved the four part harmony in the hymns from my Calvinist tradition, there was just so much extra in the Anglican service. When I first discovered Morning Prayer, it was like opening a treasure chest. Even something as simple as Marbecke's Apostle's Creed blew me away.

What made you come to Christ Church Brampton last year?

Having been wooed over the past years while at St. George's Anglican in Georgetown, following 15 years of dedicated service to that parish, I finally decided it was time to make a change in my professional career and religious environment.

What are some of your other musical commitments outside the church?

I perform locally here in Brampton with the Rose Symphony Orchestra. This season, I was their featured pianist on October 1st in a performance of Liszt and Beethoven. In addition to my concert pianist work, I perform on harpsichord with an orchestra and choir including groups such as the Toronto Symphony and the Boris Brott Festival. I teach approximately 15 private piano students each year. I also lead a wonderful Baroque choir and chamber orchestra called the Georgetown Bach Chorale.

What do you like to do with your time other than perform music?

In the summer time, I like to throw hay bales on farms south of Georgetown. In order to facilitate the many musical projects I do, staying healthy and working out is also a great passion of mine.

What are your plans for the future of the music program at Christ Church?

One of my plans for the future is to do a collaboration celebrating the purchase of the new Kawai keyboard. It will allow us to perform a Paul Halley piece that involves two pianists, choir and percussion. I think this would be a wonderful way to unite the various musical groups that exist at Christ Church. I am also interested in introducing some new service music to the seasonal settings to help enrich the congregation's liturgical experience.

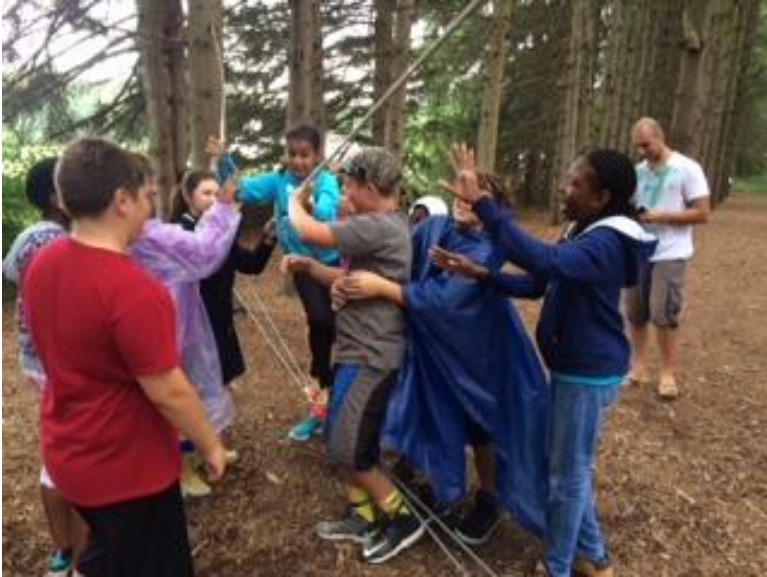

Congregation Contributions

What's in a Song?

Remember those crops that were planted in the spring? All summer long they were tended with care in hopes that the yield will keep us through the difficult months ahead. This practice occurs every year as we anticipate the long winter, when the land sleeps and food becomes scarce. Well, that is how it used to be. Now we have Metro, Sobeys and an intricate transportation system to keep the food coming. Nonetheless, Harvest season is a wonderful illustration of spiritual bounty, yielded from conscientious discipline. This is the task appointed to us.



Cecil Frances Alexander was born in Ireland in 1823. As a young girl, she showed a gift for poetry and her father encouraged her to use it. She became a prolific hymn writer, producing over 400 hymns in her lifetime. Being married to the Rt. Reverend W. Alexander, (Bishop of Derry) Mrs. Alexander used her songs to explain scriptural teaching to the children of the parish. This gentle act of sowing and tending not only reaped its intended bounty, but also provided significant influence for generations of songwriters to come, including modern hymn writers Keith and Kirsten Getty. Some notable hymns by Cecil Frances Alexander were “Once In Royal David’s City”, “There’s a Green Hill Far Away” and “Jesus Calls Us O’er the Tumult”.

Believe it or not, this seemingly benign piece of history has some relevance to our 21st Century lives. When Christian songs and hymns are written as an illustration of Christian scripture and principles, then the learning of them is somewhat like “hiding [God’s] word in our hearts...” (Psalm 119:105). This is what it means to anchor ourselves to a firm foundation, which is Christ. When the winds of life blow in, (concerns, anxiety, fear, loss, persecution, danger, chaos) our creeds and scripture remind us of the truth. If we reflect on the truth we understand, we take our eyes off the distractions that we don’t. It stands to reason that we need to understand and practically apply scripture, so we can look back to it in winter weather.

In the song “**Good, Good Father**”, the bridge repeats “**you are perfect in all of your ways to us**” (Deuteronomy 32:4 and Revelation 15:3). This song expresses our intrinsic value to God, who made us. I often hear from friends and colleagues, their belief that God is angry with them or God hates them. How can this be said of God, who is perfect in all of his ways to us and knows our needs before we even ask? (Matthew 6:8). If he hated us, he wouldn’t bother. Instead, he nurtures and feeds us so we can grow to be like him. Like the farmer and his crop.

Should you find yourself drifting away or forgetting God, think back on the truths that you do know about him. Trust him, and he will direct your path. (Proverbs 3:5 and 6)
