To our Clergy, Churchwardens and Parishioners

Beloved in Christ, peace and grace be with you.

This will be the first time, in almost 30 years, that I am not chairing a vestry meeting. I am one of those people who actually enjoys vestry; poring over audited financial statements, ministry reports, marking important milestones in the parish, celebrating the incredible contributions of our lay leaders (without whom very little would happen). Deeper than that, a good meeting names the anxiety we have in trying to balance the needs of the parish while trusting deeply in the hope that God will guide, provide and inspire us to deepen our faith, try new ideas and be creative in our endeavour to serve the mission of God. The vestry meeting is one moment in the year when a parish has the opportunity to look back and then to look forward. I am joined by the Area Bishops in assuring you of our prayers as you gather for your annual meeting. We also extend our deepest gratitude for all who have served so faithfully as wardens, committee members, teachers, greeters and leaders who make known the love of Christ through their offering of time, talent and treasure. If you are taking on a new role this year, a particular word of encouragement to you.

Over the last several years it has been our practice to invite each parish to consider a vestry motion that addresses issues of poverty and social action. In view of the drastically rising economic inequity in our province, this year's vestry motion asks your parish to consider *Standing in Solidarity*, by making a commitment to protect all who are living in poverty, through direct local and parish outreach and through meaningful advocacy.

On January 13th, 2019 I was formally seated as the 12th Bishop of Toronto. The journey to that moment has been heart-warming, moving and humbling. I am heartened by your words of encouragement, humbled by your support, and moved by your desire to row and to pedal! I will be forever indebted to Archbishop Colin for his encouragement and support. I am invigorated by the passion and faithfulness of our Area Bishops Peter, Riscylla, Kevin and Jenny as we step in together to write a new chapter as the College of Bishops. I am impressed beyond words by the dedication of our staff in the Diocesan office, and by the creative ways that ministry is happening every day in our parishes and centers of ministry around the Diocese.

I am thrilled to be on the road Sunday by Sunday visiting parishes, celebrating worship and getting to know you. I am finding my bearings with each of the committees, councils and task forces of the Diocese. I will be spending time with the clergy in each Deanery to glean the wisdom of those who lead in each community. In the first week of May I would like to meet with the laity of the Diocese through 5 scheduled Town Hall meetings (details will be posted on the Diocesan website). Each gathering gives us time to listen to each other, articulate our hopes for ministry, and catch a glimpse of what might be. I hope that you will join me.

May God bless you as you meet for Vestry.

AREA BISHOP'S PASTORAL LETTER TO VESTRIES, 2019

January 18, 2019

First Day of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

My sisters and brothers,

Grace and peace to you, through the Lord Jesus Christ.

I am writing this letter as I prepare to fly off to India, at the invitation of the Diocese of Madhya Kerala, to strengthen our relationship with the Church of South India. As you know, York-Credit Valley is incredibly diverse, and we have Christians, and those who are spiritually searching, worshipping in our churches from all over the globe - from Spain to Mongolia, Kenya to China, and everywhere in between.

As I visit parishes I have been freshly reminded of the palpable spiritual hunger in our neighbourhoods, and how our gracious Heavenly Father continues to draw people into Anglican churches throughout the week. Are we ready to receive them? Have we ensured our website is engaging for a spiritual seeker? Is our Sunday morning worship beautiful and welcoming for someone who has never been before? What opportunities do we provide for people to intentionally investigate the claims of Jesus, and for children and teens to explore spiritually without feeling judged? Have we noticed that people from other immigrant groups are beginning to visit our churches and are we adding, for example, music in their languages/styles and an explicit welcome in our bulletins and on our signs/websites? All of this, of course, requires prayer and hard work as well as an intentional and sometimes sacrificial commitment of resources. It is a joy for me to see first-hand how many prayerful and hard-working people there are in our churches and how they are creatively and boldly using the resources that God has provided to draw people into closer relationship with Jesus. Thank you!

May I encourage you in 2019 to dedicate creative energy into strengthening the prayer ministry of your church. Historical research has shown that time and again, renewal and new life in churches consistently begin with a renewal in the prayer life of the local church. Are your Prayers of the People each week asking God for renewal, that more visitors would come to the church, and that you would be given more opportunities to serve the poor? Are your meetings beginning and ending with time for prayer? Do you have a dedicated group praying each day for the neighbourhood, and are you equipping people to pray at home and with their children and grandchildren? All parishes in York-Credit Valley are invited to participate in Thy Kingdom Come this year, an initiative of the Archbishop of Canterbury that has become a global phenomenon - 10 days of prayer between Ascension and Pentecost for our friends to come to know the love of Jesus.

I encourage you also to present to your Vestry this year's <u>Social Justice Motion</u>, which calls us to voice our support for those with first-hand knowledge of the impacts of poverty and, as the hands and feet of

Christ, seek action on their behalf, either through direct outreach or through advocacy for policy changes or more accessible services.

I am so grateful for all the ministry - being the hands and feet of Christ - that you will be celebrating at your Annual Vestry Meeting. A deep thank you to those of you who are serving as Wardens and Treasurers, those who serve in children and youth ministry, caring for the property, making our worship of God beautiful, and those who serve in our social justice ministries.

It continues to be a joy to serve you as your Bishop, and please join me in continuing to uphold our new Diocesan Bishop, Bishop Andrew Asbil, in prayer as we move forward together following Christ.

Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. Colossians 3:13-14

INCUMBENT'S REPORT TO VESTRY 2019

CELEBRATING.... PROCLAIMING..... SERVING..... OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST.

This past year has been marked by planning, preparation and growth in new ventures in this, our corner of God's Kingdom. New people have joined our congregation, a new Curate has come on board, new programs have been initiated, new opportunities to grow in grace have blossomed as we have continued to serve one other and this community in the Love of Jesus.

WORSHIP

We sang, we prayed, we heard, and we went out to serve the Lord in our community transformed. We worshipped in the church, care facilities, the hospital and private homes, at campfires and in open fields. We celebrated baptisms, marriages, wedding anniversaries, thanksgivings, house blessings, last rites and significant events in the lives of our parish family. We had outdoor worship and a parish picnic at the Hutton farm. We had an Instructed Eucharist, and had a terrific blessing of animals. Our Bishop joined us Good Friday for both our family liturgy and the solemn observance of our Lord's Passion. Plans were launched to obtain a new hymn book (for fall of 2019) and new members were added to our Choir and Praise Team and Servers Guild. We had a terrific year in worship this year with an increase in our average Sunday attendance by 3% over the previous year.

PASTORAL CARE

We anointed the sick, accompanied the dying, comforted the bereaved and challenged the comfortable. We said goodbye to many of our own this past year as some were "promoted to glory" and others moved away. Our clergy and lay visitors were present to those who are sick and shut in; we carried communion to them, conducted worship for them, accompanied them and brought the fellowship of the church to them.

DISCIPLESHIP DEVELOPMENT

We ran our Christian basics course twice this past year, as initial preparation for newcomers, those seeking marriage and families seeking baptism. Following Christianity 101, specific baptism and marriage preparation programs were also offered. Our Lenten small group series, based on Philip Yancy's book *Prayer; Does It Make a difference*, ran in four different time slots and with four different leadership teams. Starting the 2018/2019 program year with the Diocese of Toronto Retreat in Muskoka, our Youth Group had a wonderful year of activities and events. In August 2018, we had the best week long Children's day camp ever and taught a whole bunch of kids about the Good News of Jesus. We welcomed our new Assistant Curate, the Rev. Michelle Jones. We look forward this year as we hone our skills to better *Invite*, *Welcome and Connect* new parishioners into the life of our congregation.

RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

We have a wonderfully current parish website, Facebook page and Instagram account. Our weekly sermons are posted to our YouTube channel. We use these platforms, bulletins and occasional pastoral mailings to keep everyone well informed.

This year our Property Committee had two significant unplanned capital expenses totaling over \$10,000.00 – the replacement of the Heating and Air-Conditioning unit on the parish hall roof and the replacement of bulbs for high efficiency lightening which will not only reduce our electrical expenses but increase the longevity

We explored and applied to have the ministry of a *Permanent Deacon* at Christ Church. Our discernment committee along with the Corporation and Advisory Board are delighted to support this initiative and to endorse Luigi Battista as a candidate for the Permanent Diaconate. Stay tuned for further details about this new and exciting ministry.

STEWARDSHIP

Fiscal 2018 saw the best results ever from our annual stewardship campaign. We are so grateful to every household in our parish family who have responded with such generosity and love. Our general offerings increased 4.6% over last year. Our congregation showed wonderful generosity in support of special appeals. We had two special offerings, one in support of International Christian Voice (May 2019) and the other in support of our Day Camp (July 2018).

Thanks also to our envelope secretary Caroline Atkinson for her faithful attention to donor care.

PARISH LIFE

We are a congregation that loves to gather, not only for worship but for times of service, learning and fellowship. We gather during coffee hour, dinners, barbeques, breakfasts, funeral and special receptions, concerts, field trips, youth, family and senior events. We gather to serve, nurture, support and encourage, to give and to receive, to listen and to pray, to serve and to worship. We take our place in our city, diocese and in the wider Christian community serving each other as well as the stranger.

Ours was one of the strongest Churches in support of Coldest Night of the Year. *Bella Roma*, a wonderful new Banquet, gave a chance for our kids to highlight their talents and to serve a wonderful dinner all the while raising funds in support our youth ministry. Shrove Tuesday proved to be among the biggest "turn outs" ever and we had one of the larger contingents at the Annual Regeneration Golf Tournament. We had field trips for our youth and service projects in feeding and supporting the hungry right here in Brampton. We raised a new Cricket Team to compete in the *York Credit Valley Cricket tournament* – look out next year!

A special thank you to the Ladies of the Catering Committee for their generous gift of my new Canon Cassock and cincture.

OUTREACH

Christ Church has a strong commitment to outreach and serving the poor. We contribute to the work of the church across the diocese and around the world through our diocesan allotment. Through clergy discretionary funds, individuals and families are given support for emergency food, transportation, employment-related costs, educational and medical assistance. Gifts in kind, as well as financial support are given right here in our neighbourhood to *Regeneration, Ste. Louise Outreach*, and *The Family Life Resource Centre* ministries. Around our Diocese, we give strong support to *Faith Works* which partners with a variety of ministries to those less fortunate. Across Canada, we supported the ministry of the church through the *Council of the North* and around the world we supported the *Primate's World Relief and Development Fund*.

We have a developing relationship with *International Christian Voice* in their effort to aid refugees who have suffered religious persecution in Pakistan. I am privileged to play an active role in our wider community through my participation on the board of *Regeneration Outreach Community* addressing the needs of homeless and near homeless persons with food, clothing and assistance in obtaining shelter as well as taking a leading role in food recovery in the Peel Region. New this year is a *Thrift Store* that will make available gently used clothing and household effects at low cost for anyone who can use them.

We support our local food bank through monetary and gift-in-kind donations of non-perishable food gathered every Sunday morning.

THIS COMING YEAR

We have identified three mission priorities for the upcoming year(s):

- 1. We plan to <u>increase our effectiveness</u> in <u>Inviting, Welcoming and Connecting</u> new parishioners into the life of our community.
- 2. We plan to <u>strengthen our ministry partnerships</u> (*Regeneration, International Christian Voice and others*) in order to more effectively play our role in serving our Lord in Brampton and beyond.
- 3. We plan to journey toward introduction of the Permanent Diaconate into the life of our community.

ASSISTANT CURATE'S REPORT TO VESTRY

I began my service at Christ Church Brampton as a Postulant with the Toronto Diocese in January 2019. From January to May I helped out during the Sunday services at 7:45, 9:00 and 10:45, and engaged in some pastoral visiting. I also had the joy of developing and leading a well-attended Shrove Tuesday Family Liturgy wherein we sang and marched and prayed and set palms on fire!

Journeying up to Easter, I had the pleasure of getting to know a few members of the congregation as we explored our prayer lives together in a Lenten Study.

After my ordination to the Transitional Deaconate on May 5, 2019 I was appointed as part-time Assistant Curate. I am blessed to have the Rev. Canon Dr. Byron Gilmore as my supervisor. He has shown nothing but grace and care overseeing and teaching me in all aspects of ordained ministry.

God, however, is always on the move; always creating, always eager to breath life and growth into the body of Christ. Planning is in the early stages. You will be hearing more of this exciting new way of being and how everyone can play a vital role in this ministry.

In conclusion, I want to thank all of you for how you have embraced me from the moment I set foot in the door. I am still getting to know all of you and your sacred stories. The next two years will surely take us all on a wonderful journey of discovery and growth. I look forward to walking with you.

ENVELOPE SECRETARY'S REPORT (presented by Shumaila Desrochers for Carolynne Atkinson, Envelope Secretary)

We reviewed the Contribution Range and Contribution Summary Reports highlighting that over \$11,800 per month is provided by the way of $\underline{\mathbf{P}}$ re- $\underline{\mathbf{A}}$ uthorized $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ emittance ("PAR").

Parishioners are asked to destroy expired envelopes, particularly if they move to PAR because their envelope number may be reassigned. Parishioners are asked to provide updates should they be relocating ~ often the only way we find out is when a mailing is returned by Canada Post.

The following table was presented that illustrates the average annual gift per contributor over the last 4 years. The circled area indicates a significant recovery in our offerings. Last year, we reported that our 2 year trend had dropped 9% putting Christ Church under tremendous financial pressure. The average annual gift per subscriber increased over 20% year over year is a measure of congregational health. The decline in Envelope Subscribers is a result of further refining and understanding our donor base. It represents are more accurate picture of our contributors.

2018 STEWARDSHIP FOCUS

On an annual basis we have a stewardship focus period and this year was no exception. Stewardship is conducted prior to the formulation of the budget for the following year. The Envelope Secretary provides compiled results to the Corporation as what can be expected in the way of offerings. As illustrated below, our focus period resulted in an \$18,500 commitment in increased offerings as compared to the previous year's actual. Of note, is that the PAR increased by 10% as a July 1.

FISCAL 2018 FINANCIAL REPORT (draft released September 23, 2018 presented by Sonia Sobers)

Financial statements are presented in a format that combined the Heritage and General Funds as per accounting principles. Also included in the Statements are funds held in the Consolidated Trust that is managed by the Diocese of Toronto. These funds are a result of selling the rectory some years ago. Christ Church can normally count on between \$4,500 and \$5,000 per year in dividend income. Copies of the Financial Statement are a watermarked draft by MNP LLP, who prepared them, until they are approved by Vestry.

As at Year-End Fiscal 2018, Christ Church realized an operating surplus of \$3,294. This is an extraordinary turnaround as compared to the Fiscal 2018 Budget where we expected to be in a deficit position of -\$22,000. We are extremely grateful and encouraged that offerings will be sustained throughout the year.

MOTION

1. To approve the Financial Statements was moved by Don Joshua and seconded by Joanne. Motion was carried.

The setting of a Heritage Cap was not required because a balanced Fiscal 2019 Budget was presented. This is the first year since the Heritage Guidelines were introduced in 2009 that this has occurred.

FISCAL 2019 BUDGET (draft released September 23, 2018 presented by Sonia Sobers)

The following key budget assumptions were presented:

- All expenses will be reviewed for potential savings; however historically it has never been about expenses which are prudently managed
- Modest salary increase of 3% (salary increases did not occur in Fiscal 2018)
- Continued monitoring and communication with regard to financial position and stewardship information
- Overall offering increases in were budgeted at 7% ~ a realistic number based on F2018 actual and stewardship results
- PAR increased by 10% as at July 1st as result of F2019 commitments being activated

For the first time in many years, a balanced budget was presented to Vestry. The motion to approve the F2019 Budget was moved by Corrine Andrews and seconded by Jim Wyllie. Motion was carried.

CONCLUSION

Byron voiced his thanks to those that we stepping down from their positions within Corporation and Advisory Board. Specifically these included Peter Harvey as Rector's Warden and Heather Grégoire, Sean Joseph and Donna Watson as members of Advisory Board. Catherine Archdekin voiced thanks on behalf of the Parish for Byron and the same by Don Joshua for Martha Whittaker.

There being no further business a motion for adjournment was made at 12:40 pm. The meeting closed with a prayer.

SUMMARY OF SPECIAL VESTRY MEETING - 2019 SOCIAL JUSTICE MOTION

The following motion was passed at a Special Vestry held on March 3, 2019:

We, the Vestry of the Parish of Christ Church (Brampton) commit to standing in solidarity with those living in poverty by taking the following actions:

- 1. Further deepen our existing relationships with our local ministry partners (*Regeneration and Ste. Louise*) by promoting opportunities for volunteerism and engagement.
- 2. Increase our advocacy by engaging with those seeking to provide affordable housing for the homeless in downtown Brampton.



EUCHARISTIC LAY ASSISTANTS AND READERS 2019

For those who have joined our church recently and are not familiar with the roles of the ELAs and Readers, let me take this opportunity to explain the differences to you.

A Reader is one who reads either the Old Testament Lesson and/or the New Testament lesson, sometimes referred to as the "Epistle." The position of a Reader is in part symbolic, acting to remind the congregation of their identity as the Body of Christ, and as such, the lay reader should not be set apart in such a way as to create an unnecessary distinction between themselves and other members of the parish, hence the "Reader" comes from the congregation.

The ELA is there to assist the priest during the service. S/he is there to prepare the altar for communion. The main role of the ELA is to assist in the administration of the bread and/or chalice at Holy Communion. An ELA will also assist with the readings. All ELAs have been licensed by the Bishop of Toronto to assist clergy in the execution of many duties surrounding our worship. An ELA is also authorized to take the Consecrated Elements in a timely manner following a Celebration of Holy Eucharist to members of the congregation who, by reason of illness or infirmity, were unable to be present at the Celebration.

The sacrament of Christ's body and blood is offered in both the bread and the wine. You are welcome to receive both or either depending on your religious background. Please DO NOT intinct (dip) the host (bread)

Another year is over and our small dedicated Eucharistic Lay Assistants (ELAs) have continued to faithfully serve at our various services. Because we are small in number, our members are called upon more often to serve and assist the Incumbent at our various services.

We were pleased to have Sonia Sobers, Maria Olivari and Noel Kokhar join our team of readers. They read at the 7:45, 9:00 and 10:45 respectively. We were also pleased to have Luigi Battista join our team as a Eucharistic Lay Assistant at our 10:45 am service.

I believe that it is their love for their ministry whether it is as an ELA or as a Reader that our members give of their time so generously and for this we are truly in their debt.

From time to time we schedule training for our Eucharistic Lay Assistants and Readers. If you feel called to either of these ministries, please let Byron or me aware of your calling.




Our group is always looking to expand ~ whether it be on a count team or a Sunday morning sides team, speak to me or anyone one of us about this rewarding ministry.



CARING AND SHARING 2019 (December 2018)

As always, it's a privilege to be the bearer of the good news to parents and grandparents whom so desperately worrying for their families. Christmas received with Gods' Love brings Hope and Thankfulness, confirmed. Yes, we will be doing it again in 2019!

Christ Church's "Caring and Sharing" outreach ministry was able to replace worry with joy for 9 families this year. I cut the number of people down in anticipation of less giving available, but God provided more for less! These families were referred to us by The Knights Table, The Boys and Girls Club of Peel and Ste. Louise Outreach.

Beginning in mid-November; parishioners began to contribute in all sorts of ways and encouraged others to do the same.

On Sunday, December 16th the gifts were brought to the church, were sorted and organized, and then each family's Christmas tote was packed. Each tote was wrapped to present with care; a stocking and substantial gift for each family member, and a generous amount of grocery vouchers and/or groceries to provide much more than enough for Christmas dinner.

Deliveries were made with complete success by our delivery team to locations in Brampton and a few extras leading to our Lords day.

We estimate \$12,000 of value was delivered! We raised over \$6,000 in cash and the rest in kind. For the third year in a row we find ourselves with a bit of a surplus in order to start 2019, due to a few who did not claim their expenses. Having a surplus allows us to commit early to the current need without running the risk of being short.

At Easter 2019, for the first time, we raised funds to top up both The Knights Table Breakfast Program and Ste. Louise Food Bank. We raised more than I anticipated, so we used the difference to top them up during their summer slowdown. All receipts have not yet been submitted and will not show on this Vestry Report. I can assure you the funds were and are being spent wisely.

Thank you to everyone who participated in this ministry in so many ways, your efforts, contributions and prayers were so heart fully received.

INTERNATIONAL CHRISTIAN VOICE

This year we strengthened our relationship with International Christian Voice ("ICV"). ICV advocates for persecuted Christians from Pakistan and is Canadian Refugee Sponsorship Agreement Holder. They tirelessly work to improve conditions for persecuted minorities in Pakistan and sponsor refugees into Canada.

- In January, we were pleased to host an information session to learn about the 4,000 Christians who have fled Pakistan and are now living in either detention or hiding in Thailand.
- In March, we had the pleasure to attend the ICV Annual Fundraising Dinner. ICV was raising funds to support the sponsorship of a family of five. The father was currently being held in detention in Thailand while the mother and three children were in hiding.



• Our own, Javaid (Jim) Bakhsh was a guest preacher in early April. In conjunction with Jim's preaching we had a Special Offering that resulted in \$4,800 being presented to ICV.

PRAYER MINISTRY 2019

"The power of the prayer does not depend on the one who makes the prayer, but on the one who hears it."

The Prayer Ministry consists of a group of people who have committed themselves to pray regularly for the people and concerns that are requested of them.

Sometimes there is a desire by some to know all the technical or medical details of the situation or infirmity being prayed for. However, knowing details can fix our minds on the infirmity and prevent us from connecting with God. I firmly believe that it is, sufficient to know that someone is in distress and is in need of prayer.

Are we missing God's answer to a prayer because we have not considered any/all possible answers other than the one we expect?

The members of the Prayer Ministry MUST be able to keep what they pray for confidential and to themselves. While the knowledge of some of the situations and people they pray for will be widely known, many are confidential and must be kept confidential.

We pray for the physical, psychological, emotional and social ills of our congregation, their family, friends, of friends, care givers etc. We also pray for what is happening within our church and community.

If at all possible we want the recipients to be aware that they are being prayed for. It is a known fact, that the knowledge that one is being prayed for is psychologically beneficial. We know that our Lord answers all prayer! Not necessarily the way we wish or comprehend.

Once a month, the coordinator compiles and updates new lists for the members. During the month, new requests and updates are e-mailed to each member as soon as possible.

Our ministry is affirmed by the feedback that we receive either from those whom we have prayed for or those who have made the original prayer request. It is a privilege to be invited into the intimacy of God's children and help them on their particular journeys.

PASTORAL CARE

I've taken the liberty to change the format of recording the names of those who have requested prayers into various groups.

The new format will give us a "snapshot" for all who have asked for our prayers

It is designed with the idea to let us know the progress of the individual prayed for

- 1. **New Additions**: Those requesting prayers, sick and/or awaiting surgery and tests
- 2. After Care: Those who have undergone surgery and receiving treatment
- 3. Observation: Those who are still under observation/ checkups with some treatment after surgery
- 4. **Long Term:** Those with long term illness, those requiring palliative care and those in remission who have asked for our prayers for their continued health

It is important to remember that no group is of greater or lesser importance

ENVELOPE SECRETARY 2019

While donation receipts reflect the calendar year for tax filing purposes, the report below reflects our F2019 fiscal year ~ July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019.

Our Envelope System Program (PowerChurch), continues to intrigue and challenge me. Like any software program, the more you use it the more you become comfortable with how it works.

- Offertory envelope information is input into our database on a weekly or bi-weekly basis thus providing current individual contribution information.
- Reports are reviewed on a monthly basis to ensure that any discrepancies or inaccuracies are captured and corrected in a timely fashion.
- Pre-Authorized Remittances ("PAR") are also inputted on a monthly basis and totals are reported to the Treasurer for allocation to the different funds (e.g. general offerings, FaithWorks, Clergy Discretion, etc.)
- Fund Descriptions have been updated to better reflect various ministries where your offerings may be
 placed. We also have the immediate flexibility to add new fund. For example this past year we set-up a
 new fund to accommodate the Hymn Book Campaign.
- Keeping the Parish List updated is a continuous work in progress. <u>It would be extremely helpful to be notified of personal information change as soon as possible to keep our records up to date.</u> People may question the use of stamps in our periodic mailings but often this is the only way we are advised of someone's move and then need to investigate to obtain current coordinates.
- We have been working directly with the Count Teams to make sure that they have accurate information as to current envelope subscriber numbers.
- With a better understanding of the PowerChurch system, I was able to assist the Corporation by providing them with cumulative results regarding Stewardship Pledging Focus.
- NEW Annual Pledge Commitments were inputted into donor profiles to allow for tracking throughout the year. This information was automatically added to individual tax receipts to provide parishioners as to the status of their commitment. The pledging information is based on the fiscal year starting July 1 whereas the tax receipt information is based on the calendar year starting January. It can be a little confusing ~ for clarity, your December year-end tax receipt issued in February should indicate 50% towards your pledge which started in July (representing 6 months).

- **NEW** In November 2018, we provided interim tax receipts indicating parishioners' donations to October 31st. We plan to provide the same this year. Pledging information shown will be for the 1st Quarter in Fiscal 2020 (July 1, 2019 to October 31, 2019).
- Reports were reviewed regularly to ensure as much accuracy as possible when issuing Tax Receipts. The Annual Tax receipting in February again went very smoothly.

MAINTENANCE AND CONTACT INFORMATION

Our computerized database is important and very helpful for the recording of contact information and donations.

- Keeping our contact information current is an ongoing task; however its accuracy is reliant upon being
 advised of changes to contact information. We kindly ask that you remember to inform Christ Church
 whenever there is a change or correction required in your mailing address, email address and/or
 telephone number(s).
- It is important that we have the correct spelling of your name and current address in order to comply with Canada Revenue Agency's requirements for the issuance of tax receipts and other documents.

DONATIONS

In accounting for contributions, each donor (whether a parishioner or a visitor) is assigned a unique envelope number. Your envelope number has two benefits in that a) it provides a limit of confidentiality in the weekly offering count and b) provides individual tracking for receipting purposes. Numbered groupings are used to identify whether a contributor is:

- i. Envelope set holder (numbered 1-180)
- ii. Utilizing Pre–Authorized Giving (numbered 1,000 to 1,999)
- iii. A regular contributor who is neither of the above (numbered 400 500)
- iv. A visitor (numbered 300 399)
- v. One-time receipts, or persons that are no longer members of the parish (moved, died, etc.) (8,000+)

Over the course of the year, I have been working with the Parish Administrator to identify individuals that may be attending on a "new" and "regular" basis. This endeavour allows me to approach the individual and invite them to take a set of envelopes or go on PAR.

The overall assignment of a particular envelope category makes the management of the database and any analysis or referrals much easier as we are able to obtain information quickly and efficiently.

Your current envelope number can be found on your tax receipt or you may contact the Envelope Secretary, a Warden or the Church Office to confirm. When in doubt as to your number, please use your name. This goes a long way to ensure accurate receipting.

ENVELOPE SETS

For many years, we have ordered 180 boxed sets of envelopes. With many parish families migrating to Pre-Authorized Remittances, we are reducing the 2020 order of boxed sets to 150. Parishioners currently holding sets numbered 151-180 will be notified and reassigned.

- Please do not use previous year's envelopes. 2020 envelopes will be distributed during the first week of Advent 2019. This is critical for accurate tax receipting purposes.
- This also applies to donors who have changed to the PAR system. PAR users are kindly asked to use their new envelope number (numbered 1,000 to 1,999) or their name to ensure accurate contribution records.
- For those on PAR, we will provide you with a set of pre-numbered envelopes during the first week of Advent.

PRE-AUTHORIZED REMITTANCE (PAR)

The PAR system is operated by the United Church of Canada and is a very convenient method of making a regular monthly donation to Christ Church. In F2019, PAR provided the church with an average of \$12,800 per month (up from \$11,600 per month in F2018). This ongoing monthly income is very helpful for the operations of the parish in that it normalizes the income stream in the leaner summer months.

While the number of PAR donors fluctuates slightly throughout the year, a healthy percentage of our parish households take advantage of this method of donating. It greatly helps normalizing any seasonal fluctuations in offerings ~ your financial commitment to Christ Church is made even if you are unable to attend on any given Sunday. Should you ever wish to convert to this system, please know that you can do this at any time and that forms are available to do so at the Parish Office.

The PAR system provides the donor with the same opportunity to make regular allocations to any FaithWorks ministry and/or any ministries undertaken by Christ Church (e.g. special offerings).

Additional donations can be made at any time (e.g. Seasonal offerings, Memorials, Special Offerings, etc.), however please ensure that your name and/or your correct envelope number is clearly written on the envelope.

Table 1 – Contribution Range Report (July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019)

The table highlights our regular subscribers, specifically envelope subscribers and PAR. There are, however, a number of regular contributors in the 400 series that neither have a set of envelopes nor utilize PAR. We continue to monitor, the 400s series continued to be reviewed for more accurate reporting, specifically at the lower range. In extracting (Table 2), only the Envelope and PAR subscribers are selected to give a more accurate view of the average gift per regular contributor is revealed.

DONOR PATTERNS

We continue to develop a deeper understanding of our donor patterns. One practical outcome of this exercise is the reduction in the number of envelope sets being ordered for 2020.

Last year, we provided a simple analysis of our donors and church attendance pattern (see 2017 Vestry Summary). Again this year, analysis was completed on our top 100 donors and which service they most often attended. In cases where individuals attended more than one service, their donations were split between the services to get a more accurate/directional picture of our donor base. The dollar amounts were isolated to include only "Parish Operations" and "Seasonal Givings". Of the top 50 donors there is almost an even split between those holding Envelope Sets and those on Pre-Authorized Remittance.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE 2019

The Property Committee is given the task of maintaining our building to provide a safe and efficient place of worship for our parishioners.

In May 2018, a Special Vestry approved the replacement of the flat roof and eavestroughs over the auditorium. This work was successfully completed over the summer months, early in the Fiscal 2019 year. As part of the project and under the advice of our Consulting Engineer, we also had all the roof top drains inspected and replaced as necessary. All this work was a great benefit when our insurance company, Ecclesiastical Insurance, conducted their risk management inspection in January 2019.

In January, the Property Committee received approval from Corporation to take advantage of a government grant program to change every light bulb in the church to an energy efficient long lasting bulb. While the upfront costs were shared, it is anticipated that an annual reduction in electrical costs will be considerable.

The committee continues to maintain our building in other ways. Repairs to the organ were concluded and the outside signs have been sent away for refurbishing.

As usual, we are blessed with dedicated Property Committee who works on behalf of Christ Church and we thank them for their efforts.
